**City of Tulsa/Tulsa County Emergency Operations Plan**

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To all recipients:

Transmitted herewith is the new Integrated Emergency Operations Plan for the City of Tulsa and the unincorporated portions of Tulsa County. This plan supersedes any previous emergency operations plans promulgated by the City or the County for this purpose. It provides a framework in which the departments of the City of Tulsa and Tulsa County can plan and perform their respective emergency functions during a disaster or national emergency. This plan recognizes other cities within Tulsa County, other than the City of Tulsa, as having their own separate emergency operations plans.

This plan attempts to be all-inclusive in combining the five missions of emergency management. Those missions are: (1) Mitigation - those activities which eliminate or reduce the probability of disaster; (2) Prevention - those actions to avoid an incident or to intervene to stop an incident from occurring, with a focus on deterrence operations and surveillance systems to stop an incident before it happens. (3) Preparedness - those activities that government, organizations, and individuals develop to save lives and minimize damage; (4) Response - to prevent loss of lives and property and provide emergency assistance; and (5) Recovery - short and long-term activities which return the community to normal or with improved standards.

In accordance with the Homeland Security Presidential Directive (HSPD) 5, all agencies, departments and organizations having responsibilities delineated in this EOP will use the National Incident Management System (NIMS). This system will allow proper coordination among local, state, and federal organizations.

The Incident Command System (ICS), as a part of NIMS, will enable effective and efficient incident management by integrating a combination of facilities, equipment, personnel, procedures, and communications operating with a common organizational structure. All on-scene management of incidents will be conducted using the Incident Command System.

This plan is written in accordance with existing federal, state, and local statutes. The City of Tulsa, the Tulsa County Board of County Commissioners, the Oklahoma Department of Emergency Management, and the Federal Emergency Management Agency concur with the plan. The plan will be revised and updated as required. All recipients are requested to advise the Tulsa Area Emergency Management Agency director of any changes which might result in its improvement or increase its usefulness.

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

In reviewing the 2014 update of the Plan, with recent events in mind, I looked for emergency plans surrounding a small to large scale event surrounding a communicable disease such as Ebola hemorrhagic fever.

Although the plan does discuss chemical, biological and nuclear events within a terrorist activity, the closest plan I could find considering a governmental response to a quick spreading communicable deadly disease was in Annex H: Public Health and Medical.

Unless I am missing the appropriate section of the plan, I suggest a plan similar in framework to the existing Heat Emergency Action Plan be developed to outline a proper response to a deadly communicable disease outbreak.
